



March 7th 1947: A 25' high snow bank was pictured beside the B+O Railroad caboose at Springville Country Club.

October 9th 1947: Ladies' Golf Association elects Florence Nunweiler as new president.

October 29th 1947: Ruth Engel was Women's Club Champion and Betty Woodworth was ringers winner.

April 1st 1950: 9 new tees were added. 18 different tees were now available.

September 21st 1950: Bud Pearson's 32 for 9 holes was tied by Ken Hooper.

January 18th 1951: An annual meeting was held at Springville village office. At this meeting William Okal was retained as ground keeper.

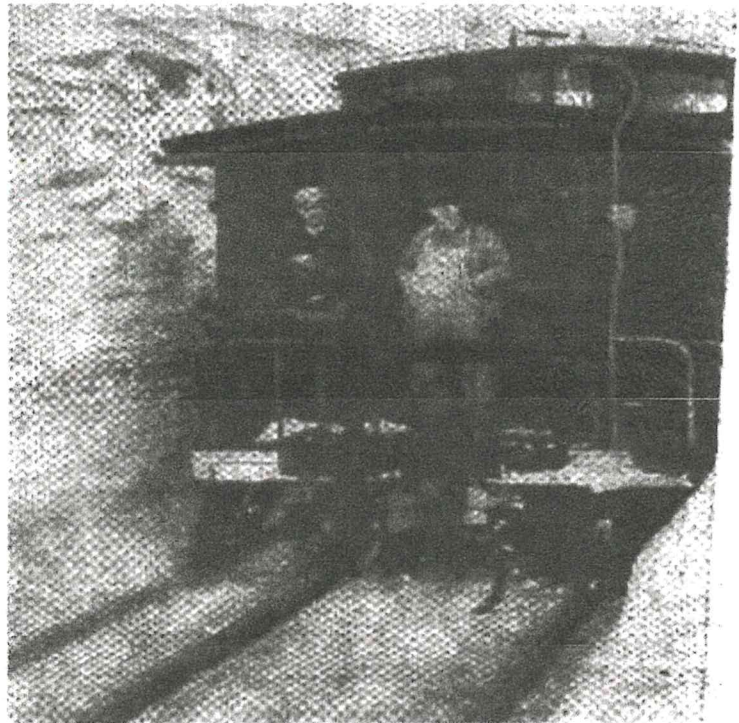
August 14th 1950: Over 100 ladies from the 8th District attended SCC's ladies guests day, including clubs: Wanakah, Elkdale, Lancaster, Sheridan, South Shore, Delaware and East Aurora.

June 5th 1956: Springville Country Club Pro Mike Parco qualified for the 56th US Open held in 1956 at Oak Hill Country Club, Rochester New York. He competed against legends Arnold Palmer, Julius Boros and Ben Hogan and Ken Venturi.

April 25th 1957: Mrs. Robert Leith became the "queen of the country club" as she scored an ace on the third hole. Her "1" was the first ever to be scored at the club by a woman. FYI- the third hole in 1957 was a 135 yard par 3 from the present Club road to our now number one green.

April 1st 195: through the efforts of Clif Cunningham a complete irrigation system was installed with all the planning and nearly all the labor done by members or through free contributions.

February 12th 1959: SCC golf pro Mark Mike Parco resigns.

April 1st 1959: Ange Alberico from Erie, PA is hired as the head golf professional.

April 24th 1959: On a Saturday morning at 11:45 a.m. a two passenger airplane was forced down and landed on the sixth fairway (which is now 18) on their way from Bradford, PA to Buffalo due to heavy rains and high winds the only place they could find to land was SCC. After two aborted attempts they landed, after bouncing several times at about 4:30 p.m. He took off again and was on his way.

November 26th 1959: Ellis Rothmeyer recorded holes in one in back-to-back years. The second one was in hole number five (which now would be teeing off at number 18 men's back tees to number 17 green).
